Shala Zemba provided a report on the President's Dinner. There were over 40 in attendance, the food was excellent, Jim Buchbinder was able to attend and two awards were presented - Rotarian of the Year to Don Mason and Rising Star to April Cohagen-Gibson.



Clifton Martin provided the member spotlight and enlightened Rotarians on the OSU Extension office and the many roles he and his staff play in our community. Clifton has served in that role for two years and is originally from Vermont. He also went on to provide accolades and praise to his sponsor and mentor Kelly Ashby (okay that's not quite what he said but he probably meant to say that.)



Today's Program:

Past President Robert England introduced today's speaker - The son of former Zanesville Rotarian Jack Joseph and Grandson of former Zanesville Rotarian Art Joseph - Noah Joseph is in his fourth season at Indiana University. He oversees the safeties and serves as defensive recruiting coordinator. Noah was the Safeties coach and recruiting coordinator in 2012 and 2013 at the University of North Texas. Prior to his stint with North Texas, Joseph served as co-defensive coordinator, secondary coach and recruiting coordinator at Montana State University. He also coached at Eastern Illinois and worked as a graduate

assistant at Drake University, Eastern Kentucky University and Iowa State University. A former player at Drake, Joseph earned Academic All-Pioneer Football League honors and was captain of the 1998 team. Joseph holds the school record for the longest interception return (100) yards. Joseph received his degree from Drake in 1999 and a master's degree from Iowa State in 2003. Noah and his wife, Lyla, have two daughters Lily age 10 and Chloe age 8.



Before his discussion on IU football, Noah began his speech with a story about Butch O'Hare - a highly decorated WWII fighter pilot and how the Chicago airport got its name. Noah then went on to talk about the culture of IU and how to teach from the heart. There are players who have not had the good fortune to grow up in households with two parents or stabilizing figures and the coaches charge themselves to hold the student athletes to high standards. In order to create this culture the coaches continue to encourage their player to remember three things - 1 - Message 2 - Mentality and 3 - Method.

Message

1. LEO - Love Each Other and be held accountable for yourself and your actions.
2. Do not care who gets the credit. If you work together everyone benefits in the end.
3. It's not about me. Your decisions effect everyone around you.

Mentality

1. Play with an edge. Confidence is a result of preparation.
2. Play Hungry - Chase perfection and achieve excellence.
3. Play focused and be focused.

Method

1. Tackling - this is worked on every day defensively.
2. Take Away - take the ball away.
3. Effort - only one person can control effort and that is you.

Noah went on to say that he was hired by Coach Kevin Wilson and then after that season Kevin was let go and is now working for OSU. IU will open their season against OSU on August 31 in Indiana.

Great questions were asked and answered regarding recruiting, team size, student athletes, and the Class of 2017 for IU.

In closing Noah shared the story of Al Capone and his attorney Easy Eddie. Because of his skill he was able to keep Capone out of jail. In return Capone paid him well and



provided him with extra things however, Easy Eddie decided that he wanted to provide a good name and set a good example for his son and because he loved his son he tried to teach him right from wrong. But one thing he could not give his son was a good name and a good example. So, he went to the authorities in order to rectify the wrong he had done and he testified against Al Capone. Within a year he was shot and killed. Easy Eddie in the end provided his son with a good name and a good example and his son's name is Butch O'Hare.
